- 2. **Membership Growth and Engagement:** With a goal of reaching 150 members by the end of 2024, BCHTX will focus on membership recruitment and engagement activities. Building a robust and active membership base is crucial for expanding the organization's impact and effectiveness in advocating for equestrian interests.
- 3. **Infrastructure Improvement:** BCHTX aims to address infrastructure needs, such as restoring the vault toilet at Big Mineral and installing new boards on rails to trails in Mineral Wells \$1,000 was raised for this project. These projects will enhance the usability and safety of recreational areas for equestrians and other trail users.
- 4. **Partnerships and Advocacy:** BCHTX will strengthen partnerships with entities like Big Bend National Park and Big Bend State Park to advocate for increased equestrian access and engagement. Collaborating with these organizations will amplify BCHTX's advocacy efforts and promote the interests of equestrians statewide.
